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SAVE LIVES: Clean Your Hands campaign, 5 May 2018 – announcing the slogan!

We are pleased to announce the slogan for the 5 May 2018 hand hygiene campaign! As the theme is health care-associated sepsis prevention and hand hygiene/infection prevention, the slogan that's been decided on is

'It's in your hands – prevent sepsis in health care'.

Once again, this year, the slogan aims to fulfill the goal of having a “joined-up” approach to infection prevention and is similar to the 2017 slogan so that each year the hand hygiene campaign will instantly resonate with people around the world.

Please spread the message – use the wording in this newsletter to share with others – we want to reach the infection prevention and control community who always support the campaign, and a new audience, those focused on prevention, diagnosis and management of sepsis in health care to garner their support and action for the sake of patient safety and saving lives.

Coming in the next couple of weeks are the “calls to action” for health care target audiences and posters containing a new image to go alongside the slogan. These will support you in your local awareness-raising. Recent WHO activity on prevention, diagnosis and management of sepsis

Sepsis is estimated to affect more than 30 million patients every year worldwide and global rates of sepsis are thought to be growing rapidly. At the Seventieth World

Health Assembly in May 2017, Member States adopted a [resolution](#) on improving the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of sepsis. The first Sepsis Technical Expert Meeting was held on 16-17 January 2018 at WHO headquarters, involving experts and other stakeholders and representatives from countries who have already progressed in the development and implementation of prevention, diagnosis and treatment of sepsis.

A new [web page](#) highlighting WHO's work on prevention, diagnosis and management of sepsis has now been launched and will feature guidelines and resources as they are launched in response to the resolution.

The WHO social media team this week issued Twitter messages raising awareness about the issue of health care-associated sepsis and to announce the 5 May 2018 slogan. Please follow WHO on social media and support the sharing of messages. These are some of them:

Q: What can cause #sepsis?

A: Sepsis can be triggered by infections caused by bacteria, viruses, fungi, and parasites, though bacterial infections are the most common. Health care-associated infections, or infections acquired during health care delivery, are common. They are a risk factor for developing #sepsis but we can prevent it.

Q: How can we prevent #sepsis?

A: Effective #HandHygiene in health care plays a role in preventing #sepsis. The 5 moments of clean hands can help.

On #HandHygiene Day (5 May), WHO will focus on #sepsis prevention.

We call on health workers, advocacy groups and authorities to take action to ensure hand hygiene is performed at the right times to prevent sepsis. It's in your hands - prevent sepsis in health care!

They offer rapid turn-around for review and publication. Volume 1, Number 1, will appear in February 2018, and the journal will be published every 2 months thereafter.

Influenza - WHO recently issued a media release stating that up to 650 000 deaths annually are associated with respiratory diseases from seasonal influenza. These figures are based on new estimates by the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (US-CDC), WHO and global health partners. WHO also updated their influenza (seasonal) factsheet, which can be found on the Organization's [home page](#), along with latest outbreak news.
